






Keynote: Matthew Joseph Heneghan - Author, Paramedic (ret.)/Veteran, Falkland Resident

Matthew provided a brief overview of who he is and why he was speaking at the NESST Conference, followed by a short overview of his evacuee story during the 2021 wildfires impacting the Falkland area.

Keynote: Jennifer Rice – MLA for North Coast & BC's Parliamentary Secretary for Emergency Preparedness

MLA Rice talked about the challenges facing BC regarding wildfires, mudslides, flooding, avalanches, and other natural disasters and an updated on the status of BC Preparedness activities.

New ESS Volunteers - Welcome to ESS and NESST - Anita de Dreu

Anita provided an overview of what to expect from the NESST Event and as a new ESS Volunteer.

Establishment of Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) - Chris Mushumanski, Nechako Valley SAR and Ian Maslin, Community Health Nurse, BCSAR

This presentation covered the essentials of GSAR in BC and the BCSARA Critical Incident Stress Management (CISM) program and a detailed look at the structure of program, training and recruitment, pros and cons, wise practices, and next steps.

Challenging Behaviors - Carolyn Sinclair, President, Strategic Business Risks International Inc.

This workshop focused on how to manage and defuse challenging behaviours that may present themselves amongst leaders, workers, and community members before during and after a disaster. Participants will gain tips and tools for guiding inclusive conversations that build healthy relationships.

Compassionate, Crisis Leadership – Kayla Pepper, EMBC

This interactive presentation invited leaders to dig into compassionate leadership concepts to enhance how we lead ourselves and others, especially during a crisis. Kayla offered practical practices to lovingly lead ourselves so that we can show up and support others in a good way which included creative problem-solving, reduced stress, increased sense of balance/calm, expanded ability to understand new perspectives, ability to serve others more effectively, and cultivating a deepened sense of personal, team and community connection. This session taught us how to fill our cups first so that we can serve people from our overflow.

Tips and Tricks for Reception Centre Manager in a Small Town – Sonja Krug, ESSD – Skeena Valley ESS

Sonja shared what has been learned over the years volunteering with ESS and having been a reception centre manager. Then you can take this information back and improve your experience in a reception centre in your small town.





Meeting the Needs of Evacuees - The Abbotsford Response to the November 2021 Floods – Laurie Pearce, Disaster Psychosocial Services Volunteer and Sarina MacDonell, City of Abbotsford, Emergency Advisor

This interactive workshop provided attendees with an opportunity to review and discuss some of the challenges and lessons learned in meeting the needs of those impacted by the 2021 Abbotsford Flood. The presenters talked about the number of unique circumstances and challenges that were faced by the volunteers, how services were provided, and some recommendations for managing future disasters.

Simplified Communication for Maximum Impact in the ESS Field – Kat Eddy, Trustee

Participants were provided with a new communication lens to engage with the broader public. They were able to review a communication tool that they use currently and learn how to redesign it to meet the needs of people with low literacy.

Introduction to Emergency Operations Centre (EOC) - Matt Herzog, Bulkley ESS

Participants review the various sections of the Emergency Operations Centre (EOC), learned about making a family plan in the event they are unable to leave the EOC or Reception Centre and the importance of the structure of the Reception Centre Organizational Chart.

Amateur Radio, Emergency Radio Communications Service and Opportunities for ESS – Doug Steventon, North-West Region Emergency Communications Representative, Provincial Emergency Radio Communications Service / Bulkley Valley Amateur Radio Society

Doug provided an over-view of what Amateur Radio is, the capabilities, limitations, and role in emergency communications, and how Amateur Radio might assist an ESS response.

Wellness Exchange Course – Sara Frankenberger, PHSA – HEMBC Provincial Disaster Psychosocial Services Team, Education Specialist

Sara presented an overview of the course topics, activities, and sample handouts that the Wellness Exchange, a free 5-week, 60-minute virtual, free course, based on evidence-informed principles of Cognitive behavioural Therapy and behavioural activation consisting.

Emergency / Disaster Leadership: Guiding your Organization During Crisis – Pete Learoyd, Justice Institute of British Columbia, Program Director

This workshop looked at the role of crisis leaders and some of the skills and knowledge they need to effectively guide their organization or community through a disaster. Pete discussed the changing landscape for leaders of Emergency Operations Centres and Reception Centres today and explored some approaches to strategic level leadership, team management, and problem solving/decision making models to support the leaders of today.

Where ESS Meets Recovery – Deb Borsos, Community Recovery Specialist, Community Disaster Recovery

Deb provided an overview of Recovery and talked about the points where ESS teams and volunteers help and support recovery actions, how ESS volunteers can become more involved in recovery roles if they wish, as well as the potential for working in community recovery.





2021 Wildfire Season Panel – Dave Dickson, ESSD – City of Williams Lake and Liz Jones – ESSD for 100 Mile House & District ESS

Liz and Dave shared their life experiences dealing with Wildfires in the South Cariboo in 2021. They referred to the many wildfires in the past that they have managed in their Emergency

Support Services roles. Staying Well – Offsetting Stress Responses in Emergency Management - Susan Armstrong, Private Practice

Participants received a summary of the research on impacts of exposure to trauma and how to recognize impacts as they occur. Strategies to offset the absorption of other's pain and stress were introduced and practiced in the presentation. Participants were asked to reflect on previous emergency management deployments and applying strategies within the presentation time to get an experience of how they work.

The Future of Volunteerism – Discussion Panel - Faiza Venzant, Executive Director, Council for Certification in Volunteer Administration, Tara Gilroy-Scott, Coordinator, Volunteer Services, Victoria Police Department, and Julie Gallanty, Vice President, Alliance Service, NJ YMCA State Alliance

This session provided leaders of volunteers with lessons learned from the pandemic and ideas about bringing people together and speaking the language of connectivity and how to rethink connections, steward from afar, build relationships in new ways and become proficient with technologies we might not have had to use before.

Keynote – All about NESST with Deborah Jones-Middleton, NESST Organizing Chair, Director of Protective Services, Regional District of Bulkley-Nechako, Interviewed by Tanya Spooner, Manager, Emergency Programs, City of Prince George

Deborah provided a brief history of the NESST Organization, how it started and why, and talked about the dreams for the future.

Small Group Discussions

The session had groups of three meeting for ten minutes to talk about:

- How do you make time for Selfcare in your life what does selfcare look like for you?
- 2. How do we incorporate compassion in our response and service delivery?
- 3. How do we get people thinking about emergency preparedness in our community? Or other topics your group agrees to!

Volunteer Retention - Charlene Dishaw, Western Regional & Indigenous Outreach Coordinator

Participants explored what volunteers are looking for and how to create a successful plan to retain their volunteers and create ambassadors to recruit new volunteers. Charlene provided many ideas that will help them keep volunteers positively talking about their organization for years to come.





Meet and Greet presentation – Ian Pollard, Divisional Director of Emergency Disaster Services, The Salvation Army- Emergency Disaster Services

lan provided a 1-hour version of the full Meet and Greet course. It highlighted all the key concepts covered in the full course including the role of a meet and greet worker, basic skills needed, how to support evacuees and worker self-care.
